

Pony Express helps Reno Rodeo Celebrate 100 Years

Every year in June, Pony Express volunteer riders from many states conduct a historical re-ride from St Joseph, Missouri to Sacramento, California or reverse from Sacramento to Missouri. This year was particularly special because the Reno Rodeo, while celebrating their 100 Year Anniversary, asked the Pony Express riders to lead off their celebratory parade with mochilla exchanges down the Parade route. So, two days after the end of the re-ride, Pony Express riders gathered in Reno to participate. They not only came from Nevada but some braved the trip from as far away as Colorado and as close as our neighbor to the west, California, to help Reno Rodeo celebrate.

Starting at the end of the parade route, but before the official beginning of the parade, at approximately 2 block intervals, the Pony Express riders would stop and wow the crowd with their efficiency in taking the mochilla from one pony and dropping it onto another pony to continue the ride. This is not unlike the exchanges that take place out on the lonely trails that link St Joseph to Sacramento. The crowds gathered along the parade route applauded and cheered the ponies every step of the way, as though they were once again watching history unfold.

As the parade made its way through downtown Reno, the Rodeo queens, princesses and assorted drill teams came through with bright colors and precision, leaving behind pomp or circumstance and having just a very relaxed atmosphere. At the tail end of the horse display were the Pony Express riders, who, while in formation, showed themselves to be excellent horse men and women controlling their mounts even with the throngs of people gathering around and the sounds of the cheers.

With pride, they presented themselves admirably. Go Pony, Go!

Colorado Re-Ride 2019

This year's 40th Anniversary of the NPEA Annual Re-ride was celebrated by Colorado riders in early morning sunlight. This was due to the mail being received 3.5 hours later than the tentative schedule. We made up 15 minutes of this deficit, due to the diligence of some our younger riders,

to be true to the "Pony" and ride with the wind! Our youngest member ran 4 miles of our 38-mile ride this year. What made his ride special for his first ride as an official member was clocking an average of 23 mph on his first two-mile run, and 26 mph on his second stretch – coming to a sliding stop, leaping off, throwing the mochila on the next riders mount to set off over the next hill! Not only in the movies With an addition of a new member from Calhan, 175 miles from Julesburg, our crew felt we had a most successful re-ride through our route of the XP Trail. Our President, Linda Dolezal, traveled to Reno the very next week to

participate in the XP portion of honoring Reno's 100thAnniversary of Rodeo. She was one of 4 states representing Pony Express for this event.

We were pleased to have NPEA President Dean Atkins and Jack Davis, NPEA Treasurer in attendance at our annual XP Re-Ride picnic at the Julesburg Welcome Center Wednesday evening

before our leg of the ride. President Dean swore in the Colorado Division riders. Fellowship of past and present riders was enjoyed. Several riders from the early 1980's were in attendance and shared their trial experiences. The Price family brought well documented scrapbooks from the early re-rides, which will also be on display at the National Convention.




Convention 2019 - Julesburg, Colorado

As a member of the media team, it was exciting to see some of the real quick exchanges that took place during this year's re-ride. During the 10 day ride, we received numerous pictures and read lots of interesting stories about the ride as it headed west across the Pony Express Trail. This was our third year monitoring the ride in its entirety. We have garnered a good fan base who also follows the mail across the trail.

One of the fastest rides was done by a first year rider in Colorado. 14 year old Kyle, rode two, 2 mile stretches. His first 2 miles he rode a constant 23 miles an hour. He tried to outdo himself on his second leg, by riding 26 miles an hour for the first mile and the second mile at 20, on an older horse. Kyle leapt off his horse at a sliding stop and threw the mochila on the next horse. He performed like the riders did in 1860-61. Congratulations Kyle on a job well done. We look forward to watching you ride in the future.



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
Henry Kreiensieck History with the Pony Express


My family connection to the Hollenberg Pony Express Station at Hanover, Kansas began with my Great Grandfather Henry J, Kreiensieck as a young boy of 14 coming from Hannover, Germany and being indentured to Gerat Hollenberg for some years. He was given a section of land north of Hanover, Kansas by Mr. Hollenberg, which became the Kreiensieck Homestead. My Grandfather, Henry Jacob Kreiensieck was born on the family farm and lived there his entire life. The Pony Express asked my Grandpa if he wanted to ride in the 1960 Centennial Re-Ride of the Pony Express. He agreed to and received a Bible and revolver like the original riders carried. The Bible and revolver is still in the Kreiensieck Family. My Grandparents wrote each of their 10 grandchildren a letter that our Grandpa Henry Jacob Kreiensieck carried in his mochila and then was mailed back to us. I still have this letter and the envelope with the cancellation stamp on it. I am sure it is of no real monetary value other than sentimental value to me. When the Pony Express Association began the Annual Re-Rides, my Father, Ernest H. Kreiensieck was asked if he wanted to ride since his Father had ridden, and he agreed. He rode for 17 years and for the majority of that time he rode the same horse, "Rocky," who was the son of the horse, "Maudie," that my Grandpa rode. I also have the letter my Dad carried in his first Annual Re-Ride and again am sure it has no monetary value, only sentimental value to me.

The next and current generation of the extended Kreiensieck Family to ride is Ron Holle, a Great Great Nephew of my Grandpa, Henry Jacob Kreiensieck. He has ridden every year for the past 40 years and was able to ride during part of the time my Father, Ernest H. Kreiensieck rode and they rode out of the Hollenberg Pony Express Station area, generally either coming into or going out of the Hollenberg Station. Ron told me he intends to ride for 50 years in the Annual Re-Rides.

The Hollenberg Station as always been a source of pride to me, and as a child I still remember my Grandpa riding in the Centennial Re-Ride and being so excited. My entire school years were spent having our last day of school picnic on the grounds of the Hollenberg Station and being able to go inside the Station and see all of the memorabilia. I still enjoy visiting the Hollenberg Station and my two grandsons have also enjoyed visiting the Hollenberg Station.

My First Pony Express Ride

I first learned of my connection to the Pony Express 3 years ago while visiting Jackson, Wyoming. My mother was born and raised in Wilson Wyoming which is just a few miles from Jackson. Mom wanted to visit a cemetery where "Uncle Nick" was buried, so off we went with myself being kind of disinterested. Imagine my surprise when we arrived at his grave and the head stone was of a pony express rider and he was listed as one of the original riders! My surprises were just beginning! I became very interested as my

whole life has really been centered around horses. I asked my Mom who this Nick Wilson was to our family; she replied well, he was your great great grandfather! Why my mom never mentioned this to me before is still a mystery.

Since that day, I became interested in riding in the pony express re-ride. Nick Wilson not only rode in the pony express, but also drove the overland stage and brought the first pioneers over the Tetons. Wilson, Wyoming is named after him; he settled there and raised his family. He wrote a book ("The White Indian Boy") about his life, and there was even a movie filmed about him.

My busy life and career got in the way of me riding in the re-ride for a couple of years but not this year! I did some research, joined the National Pony Express and got into contact with Petra Keller. Petra helped me every step of the way, thank goodness!! She gave me all the information I needed and answered my endless amount of questions.

When I jumped on my horse with the mochilla that morning and raced down the trail, I don't think I have ever felt so proud! It was a very emotional time for me and my family; I feel so blessed to have been able to participate in this historical event!

I am hooked and will be back nort year! GO PONY!

Ride for the Heroes



Toole County, Utah, Sign Project Completed





The trail signing project for western Tooele County, Utah, has been completed. On the weekend of July 5 and 6, Utah Division members Art Johnson and Pat Hearty joined National President Dean Atkin on a trip to Utah's west desert to install the final twelve signs for Tooele County. In the two-day project, signs were placed between Callao, Utah, and the Nevada border just west of Ibapah. The night of July 5 was spent at Willow Springs Ranch, in the shadow of the historic Willow Springs Pony Express Station. On a previous work trip, on May 23, another dozen signs were installed between Lookout Pass and the site of the old Riverbed Station.

These signs, which stand about eight feet tall, mark the original route of the Pony Express. The signs were designed and produced by Aaron Mahr's National Park Service office in Santa Fe, NM, and placed according to a site plan developed by Madison Vandersee. Sign posts and hardware were provided by a Tooele County Tourism Tax grant, and labor for installation by members of the Utah Division, National Pony Express Association. We are proud to be a part of this cooperative effort.

Next up is a sign project in White Pine County, NV, starting soon.

Re-ride Letter update:

The letters made the trip by Pony and California canceled them with a special cancelation stamp, placed them in the US mail and they have arrived at their designation. I have received several envelopes back that are an incorrect address. We are in the process of calling on the purchaser to see if we can get a correct address to send them too.

This year we sent out a postcard to all non-members that had ordered a letter last year directing them to our web page to access the letter application.

Personal letter sales were up this year at 102. I called on 10 applicants that had not sent their letter back to be included in the mochila. I still did not get letters back from 2 people. The commemorative letter sales were at 687. I had some excellent help from Connie Ladner and Sarah Bailey in preparing them to be placed in the mochila.

There were several letters carried at the Reno Rodeo event to be delivered to dignitaries of Nevada. There was an application for the 2020 letter linked to the Reno Rodeo web page and I have received 2 applications for 2020 letters already.

I am looking forward to seeing many of you in September.

NTIR Near Real-Time Mapping of the Pony Express Re-Ride

The National Trails Intermountain Region (NTIR) continues working with partners in innovative ways using various GIS technologies to engage and inform the public of the National Historic Trails. NTIR recently coordinated with the National Pony Express Association (NPEA) to redevelop the workflow and platform for displaying near real-time data for the Pony Express Re-Ride. This included utilizing data translation software, creating automated processes to post the locational data online, and creating an ESRI ArcGIS Online web app to display the re-ride data. The annual commemorative re-ride conducted by members of NPEA along the Pony Express National Historic Trail recreates the 18 operational months of the Pony Express between April 1860 and October 1861. Beginning on June 10, 2019 in St. Joseph, MO, riders traveled more than 1,800 miles from station to station traversing eight states while carrying a SPOT GPS tracking device within a mochila saddlebag to allow the public to follow riders along the trail until their final station in Sacramento, CA. The Rider Locations can be viewed by the public on the 2019 Pony Express Annual Re-Ride Web Map/App here: https://nps.maps.arcgis.com/apps/webappviewer/index.htm-1?id=561cc0594efb434fb4a86b8a428fd732.

During the re-ride, the viewer updated the Rider Location approximately every 10 minutes. The web app allowed the public to follow the rider 24 hours a day as they made their long travel across the western United States. During the Pony Express Re-Ride, there were over 20,000 views of the web mapping application from June 10th to June 20th. There were over 3,000 views on the first day and approximately 2,000 views per day. The web mapping application proved a great success by tracking the progress of the Pony Express Re-Ride, approximating when riders would be arriving at stations, and creating a safer environment for the riders. Completion of this project is one of the examples of how NTIR collaborates and supports partners like NPEA with Geographic Information Systems (GIS) expertise to promote the Pony Express National Historic Trail.







As things go, it went to a teacher who thought it would be great to learn more about the Pony Express and have her students write letters. Who knew this would lead to a request to speak to students. The Re-Ride was intriguing for the history as well as photographic and geocaching possibilities, but this adventure far exceeded our expectations. We followed the Re-Ride each day until nightfall and then drove several hours to stay the night somewhere near where a rider was expected to arrive the next morning. Then we faced the challenge of finding that rider. Several times we were directed to the correct turn by hoof prints and fresh horse droppings!

David took 7,826 photos, which he has been very busy editing. A few of them appear in this article. When the editing is complete, many more will be posted on his gallery, and we will let you know how to request copies. Sally found her geocaches.

We were very impressed with the monuments, remains, and recreations of Pony Express stations and the additional history we learned. But what impressed us the most was the friendliness and cooperative attitude of the present day riders. We were impressed by the family and even generational nature of the participation. We were amused by the neighborhood horses and llamas that paid such enthusiastic attention to the Re-Riders as we passed by, while the cows took no notice at all. We were impressed by the riderless horse ceremonies and how even the horses themselves seemed to understand the solemnity of each occasion. We were of course impressed day after day by how lovingly all the horses were handled. We were

impressed with how the clouds of dust raised by each galloping horse lingered as the horse sped past. We are happy to have many pictures to help keep the memory of this wonderful adventure from fading. Thank you, everyone!
